She has published seven books of poetry, including *The Weather of Old Seasons* (Cross-Cultural Communications), and *Where I Come From* and *Things My Mother Told Me* (Guernica Press). Her work has appeared in *Prairie Schooner, Poetry Ireland, The New York Times, Connecticut Review*, and *Rattle*, among other journals and anthologies.
